Ambassador of Georgia to the Kingdom of the Netherlands (2010-2014) Shota Gvineria

In an hour or so I was in my residence near <u>Scheveningen</u>, and next morning I went to the Embassy, which is located on <u>Groot Hertoginnelaan</u>. Later that day I went to the bank to open my account. When the lady asked my name and I Said Gvineria - she replied – oh, what a difficult name!

Being as young and inexperienced for such an honorable mission, I released that there was a lot to learn.

The way **how Dutch organize things; do business, plan, evaluate, provide feedback** is something that **infected** my personal and professional style forever.

Here I want to thank all my colleagues and friends who helped me to undertake the duties the way I did.

Not only were these 4 years pleasant, but also quite fruitful as well. There have been quite a few important initiatives undertaken, which we believe/<u>or at least hope</u>, has played a positive role in further strengthening the already existing ties between Georgia and The Netherlands at various levels.

This is why I'm also particularly proud of the **<u>Netherlands Georgia Business Council</u>**, which we have founded with my friends over a year ago.

Jointly we have organized a number of significant economic and cultural projects, which has greatly contributed to the fact that The Netherlands is <u>on top of the investors list</u> in Georgia for last few years.

On June 27 Georgia is signing the <u>Association and Deep and comprehensive free Trade Area</u> <u>agreements</u> with the European Union.

I'm sure that this historic step will help Dutch and European companies to make even better use of the opportunities Georgia can offer and will contribute to achieving our ultimate foreign policy priorities – integration into the European and euro Atlantic structures.

Today we are celebrating **the Independence Day** of Georgia and I want to congratulate my country on achieving such a significant recognition of the progress made towards its irreversible Europeanization path.

Today is one of my final events in the Netherlands and I want to thank many people for their support for making today's program possible. Later on this afternoon we will have some Georgian polyphonic music, wines, with the history of 8000 years, and of course Georgian cuisine, kindly offered to us by the Georgian diaspora.
